a. Case rounds:

Weekly sessions, twice weekly; 30 min per session.

The resident will orally present their selected challenging cases for review Additionally, the resident's referral letters from all cases will be reviewed by a mentor for the first 6 months.

b. Journal club:

Once weekly session, 1 hour per session.

Prior to each session, the resident and/or mentor(s) select journal article(s). Each individual reviews his/her journal article and a written review stating the top three salient points is composed. An emphasis will also be placed on analyzing materials and methods of each paper.

The resident is expected to:

- Read all articles prior to the Journal Club.
- Gather the articles in pdf format and email the mentors the articles at least one week prior to the Journal Club.
- Disseminate the reviews after the Journal Clubs.

c. Dermatohistopathology training:

Weekly session, one hour per session

The program will begin with review of textbooks and ACVD resident forum material with an emphasis on learning pattern analysis and basics of dermatohistopathology. After the establishment of a foundation in histopathology, slides from clinical cases will be reviewed using the digital microscope. Starting in the third year, unknown slides will be introduced for the resident to write up.

d. Basic science learning rounds:

Monthly sessions, 4 hours per session

Readings and presentations on selected topics will be assigned to the resident. The resident will be instructed in the following subjects: genetics, biochemistry, embryology, anatomy/physiology of the skin and adnexal structure, pathomechanisms of all dermatological diseases, immunology, bacteriology, mycology, virology, parasitology, internal medicine, nutrition,

oncology, pharmacology, clinical pathology, dermatohistopathology and comparative dermatology.
