  - a. **Case rounds**: 1 hour weekly or patient-side throughout the clinical day. The resident will orally present selected cases for review.
  - b. **Journal club**: 4 hours monthly/3 sessions.

    A resident will select four journal articles to review. The resident will write a review stating the clinical importance. An emphasis will be placed on the methods and materials section. The resident will email the articles in pdf format to the mentors prior to the Journal Club.
  - c. **Histopathology training**: 4 hours monthly including rounds and unknown slides review. The program will begin with the review of textbooks and ACVD Resident Forum material with an emphasis on learning pattern analysis and basics of dermatohistopathology. After the establishment of a foundation, slides from clinical cases will be reviewed. Skin biopsies are sent to Idexx Laboratories, Antech Laboratories and/or Harris Histology Services. A copy of the slides will be made available to the residents and added to our already existing collection. Starting in the second year of the program, unknown slides will be introduced. The residents will have access to the Veterinary Dermatopathology Atlas online as well as rounds with a dermatohistopathologist. The residents will be encouraged to attend the ESVD Dermatopathology Workshop.
  - d. **Basic science learning / didactic rounds**: 4 hours monthly/one session. Readings and presentations on selected topics will be assigned to the resident. The resident will be instructed in the following subjects: genetics, biochemistry, embryology, anatomy/physiology of the skin and adnexal structure, pathomechanisms of all dermatological diseases, immunology, bacteriology, mycology, virology, parasitology, internal medicine, nutrition, oncology, pharmacology, clinical pathology, dermatohistopathology and comparative dermatology.
